Cultural Diversity Definition

The cultural diversity requirement equips students with knowledge and academic tools to successfully navigate a global community and diverse American communities. These courses examine cultures outside the United States or marginalized/underrepresented groups within the United States and help students appreciate important differences among cultures of all kinds to enrich the understanding of human interactions.

All undergraduate students are required to complete two courses:

- one that focuses on global populations and the cross-cultural experience
- one that focuses on marginalized/underrepresented groups in the U.S.
