## University budget approved

The 1982-83 University of Missouri general operating budget got preliminary approval from the Board of Curators.

The university received \$170.4 million from legislation signed by Gov. Christopher S. Bond in early June. This amount is \$17.2 million more than was appropriated by the state in 1981.

The university also was to receive \$105.3 million from non-state funding that will create an overall operating budget of \$275.8 million received in 1981-82.

"The increase in funding means that we can replace some of the things that were cut this year," Chancellor Arnold B. Grobman said, "such as library hours and acquisitions."

Through the recent passage of a \$600 million bond issue, UMSL has proposed to set aside \$320,000 to build a new science building on campus. The UM system has proposed \$36 million for new construction on the four campuses. This proposal will be submitted to the state for consideration in 1983-84 and will be given final approval from the Board of Curators at its meeting July 29 and 30 at UMSL.

UM President James C. Olson predicted that non-state funding would increase to \$8.2 million due to the increased student fees on all four campuses. Internal adjustments and reallocations for the university would earn \$5.9 million to meet any new budget adjustments found necessary. This money is used to cover costs of auxiliary enterprises, special income enhancement and some reallocations. The reallocations are about 2 percent of the 1981-82 budget.

Olson said that \$15.3 million of the \$31.3 million state and non-state income increase would be used to provide a 9 percent average increase in salaries and wages for faculty and staff members. Another \$2.7 million will be used for adjustments in employee benefits. The balance of the income will be used to pay for specific campus items and cost increases in fuel and utilities, library acquisitions, and expenses and equipment.

## Johns attends to daily obscurity

Elasco Denver Johns is like the actors in television commercials — everyone recognizes their faces, but no one knows their names. Thousands of UMSL students and staff have met Johns, but few know his name. He has been the daily parking lot attendant since August 1975.

Johns got his job at UMSL through the state rehabilitation office after suffering a back injury. Three months in cervical traction helped his back, but left him restricted from lifting more than 15 pounds. Before he was injured he worked at Wagner Electric Corp. for 15 years.

The job of collecting parking fees is suited perfectly not only to Johns' health, but also his personality. Johns is pleasant and courteous to all. He said that in all of his years at UMSL "very few students have ever been smart with me." Perhaps this is because he thinks the best part of his job "has been getting to talk to the students."

Since Johns is a full-time staff member he had to come to work during the "big snow" week last February even though the school was closed. He trudged through knee-deep snow to get to his little toll booth. From here he



watched the road graders and trucks try to clear the parking

Bags of salt in his toll booth aren't to help students who get stuck. They are for him. He puts salt in the tracks of the sliding door so the door won't freeze shut locking him inside. There is a telephone connected to a police dispatcher in the toll booth so Johns isn't completely at the mercy of the weather.

Anyone having car trouble near Johns' post would only have to walk over and tell him. He could then relay the message to the UMSL police who would send their emergency vehicle.

However, by Sept. 1 Johns will no longer be at his post. By then, Johns said, mechanical arms will be installed near the entrance to the Daily Parking Lot. A chainlink fence is to be built around the entire parking lot to prevent people from jumping the concrete blocks, he said.

Although Johns' job would be eliminated along with the part-time relief person's, he said UMSL is trying to find another place for him on the staff. Johns is almost 59 and would not be eligible for UMSL retirement until age 60. Even then he would be heavily penalized for taking early retirement. He hopes to continue working here until he is at least 62.

Johns can see one problem which the mechanical arms will create. The arms won't be able to let a student sign in on his parking sticker number to avoid payment of a 50-cent parking fee. Until now a student could give Johns his number if he was driving a car without a sticker, as long as he had a sticker on his own car.

The four-day week at UMSL during the summer means that Johns works 10 hours a day for four days. He admitted that "it makes for a long day," but he really enjoys having three days off. His spare time is filled with

many activities such as fishing, hunting, gardening and painting his house. He said with a bit of pride in his voice, "I own my own home."

To keep from getting bored during the slow hours, Johns has a radio and magazines. He admits that it is a mental strain at times, but he's grateful to be in out of the weather.

However, the weather sometimes comes in with him. The small toll booth has a metal roof and sides with windows all the way around — and no insulation. Consequently, during the blistering summer of 1980, the 6,000 British-thermal-unit air conditioner quit blowing cool air whenever the temperature got up to 100 degrees. It would just run as a fan. Johns would sometimes sit under a nearby tree to escape the oven-like building.

Johns is one of many UMSL workers who is rarely spotlighted. His helpful attitude and pleasant smile make things go more smoothly on this large campus. And that's not a small job.

## **Curators adopt resolution**

[Editor's note: The following is the resolution adopted by the UM Board of Curators stating their position on further cuts and reductions on all campuses.]

The Board of Curators of the University of Missouri notes with approval the decision of the Administration not to recommend the elimination of any academic programs in connection with the 1982-83 operating budget or the 1983-84 Legislative request.

This Board hereby states the sit will not terminate any academic departments of the University System solely for financial reasons in the forseeable future. The departments that were targeted for elimination or reduction are not to be held in

jeopardy, but will remain viable programs of this University.

The Board reaffirms its commitment to maintain and strengthen the University of Missouri as one of this nation's major land grant institutions. We fully intend to seek to improve the salaries of our good faculty and staff, to improve our libraries and laboratories, and to make our facilities safe, functional and attractive. We intend to aggressively meet our Affirmative Action goals as regards to handicapped, minorities and women.

We recognize that increased State and Federal support, private support and fee income will be necessary to achieve these goals. We further recognize that every penny must be spent wisely. We call on all employees of this University to examine carefully their units and activities to try to effect savings. The Board of Curators will examine its own operations and reduce costs.

We recommend establishment of a new Committee of the Board, a Long Range Planning Committee, which will immediately begin to work with the Administration and all employees in the preparation of a Long Range Plan. We will review before October 31, 1982, savings employees have identified, progress toward increasing University resources, and the development of the Long Range Planning effort.

## Fedder to speak at graduation

Edwin H. Fedder will deliver the commencement address and Howard F. Baer and retired St. Louis Circuit Judge Noah Weinstein will receive honorary doctorates of humane letters at the annual summer commencements Aug. 1 beginning at 3 p.m. at the Mark Twain Building.

Fedder is a professor of political science at UMSL and director of the Center for International

He is the editor of "Defense Politics of the Atlantic Alliance" and the author of "NATO: The Dynamics of Alliance in the Postwar World" along with several articles and monographs. He frequently addresses civic groups nationwide as well as in Great Britain, Italy, West Germany, Denmark, Sweden and Japan.

Fedder came to UMSL in 1967 and has served as director of the Center for International Studies since 1968. During the 1981-82 school year, he was chairman of the UMSL Senate.

This fall, Fedder will be on research leave, working out of London, and will be guest professor at the University of Surrey, a Visiting Foreign Scholar at the Royal Institute of International Affairs, and a Fellow of the International Institute of Strategic Studies.

Baer is a civic leader who helped shape the cultural character of St. Louis. He was born in West Virginia and educated at Princeton University. He has lived in St. Louis since 1924. Baer has written his autobiography titled "St. Louis to Me." Baer joined the A.S. Aloe Co. in 1927 and served as president of the company from 1929 until

In 1974, he became chairman of the board of the Bank of Ladue. He also has been a board member of the St. Louis Airport Commission, a trustee and president of the St. Louis Chamber of Commerce from 1945 to 1953, and a trustee of the Missouri

Baer spent over 10 years on the St. Louis Zoological Board of Control. He still is active as vice president of the Zoological Park Subdistrict Commission, as director of the Municipal Theatre Association, and as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Missouri Botanical Garden.

He has been recognized with such awards as the National Conference of Christians and Jews Brotherhood Citation in 1967, the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics Civic Award in 1969, the 1969 St. Louis Award and the Globe-Democrat's Man of the Year Award in 1971.

Weinstein is a native Missourian who worked his way through Harvard University and Harvard Law School. In 1930, he returned to St. Louis to practice law for 24 years before being appointed Circuit Judge.

He remained there until his retirement at age 70 on Feb. 1, 1976. At his retirement, joint resolutions of the Missouri Senate and House of Representatives honored the judge and his exceptional career.

His first assignment was in the St. louis County Juveniel Court in 1956. He was one of the leaders in drafting a new juvenile code for Missouri, which became law in 1957. The new law emphasized rehabilitation of the child and gave broad discretionary powers to the juvenile judge. He also fought for the approval of a bond issue which provided new detention facilities and made the juvenile court a separate and coordinate branch of county government.

Weinstein currently is president of Therapy Consultants and Associates, and serves on the boards of both the Crusade Against Crime and the Youth Emergency Service.

#### MacKinney named to post

Arthur C. MacKinney, vice chancellor of Academic Affairs at UMSL, has been elected president of the Missouri Psychological Association.

This group consists of over 600 professional and academic psychologists of all specialties throughout Missouri. MacKinney served as secretary in 1981-82 and will take office as president in 1983.

Before coming to UMSL in 1976, MacKinney was the dean of Graduate Studies and research at Wright State University in Dayton, Ohio. He also has served on the faculties of the University of Minnisota, Iowa State University and the University of Wisconsin-Parkside.

In addition to academic administration and teaching, Mac-Kinney has research interests in the fields of management, manager development and performance, and psychological testing and measurement. He has published over 30 articles on psychology in professional journals.

MacKinney served as the 1981-82 president of the Division of Industrial-Organizational Psychology, American Psychological Association. He also is the former president of the Iowa Psychological Association and a professional licensed psychologist.

## Chappell leaves UMSL for familiar lifestyle

Mary Chappell is going home. Figuratively speaking, that is.

Chappell, sage of UMSL's intramural and recreational programs the past four years, has traded the big-city lifestyle of St. Louis for the snug atmosphere of Lawrence, Kan., where she recently accepted a position as assistant intramural director at the University of Kansas.

"I'm really excited about the move," Chappell said. "I'm getting back with people I started with in intramurals. I've known Tom Wilkerson (intramural director at KU) for about eight years, and I'm looking forward to working with him."

Chappell, who came to UMSL in 1978 after two years as a graduate assistant in the intramural program at Kansas State University, admitted that the salary increase in her new job at KU was a significant factor in her decision to leave. But it wasn't the only reason.

"It's also a family move," she said. "We wanted to get out of the city and back to the country.

Chappell was born and raised in Healdton, Okla., one of those towns where, Chappell said, "If you blink, you'll miss it.'

At Healdton High School, Chappell was a standout athlete. She received All-State and All-Conference recognition in basketball, and was tendered a scholarship from Phillips University in Enid, Okla.

Chappell said she would have played other sports in high school, but "We didn't have anything else. Basketball was

At Phillips, Chappell showed signs of becoming one of the team's top players until her career was shattered by an ankle

With her competitive athletic career gone, Chappell turned to intramurals.

"I had to find a profession I would like," she said. "That's why I went into intramurals, because I knew I still would be involved in athletics and rec-reation."

Chappell got her first professional job in 1978 when she came to UMSL as an assistant to former intramural director Jim Velten. Whe Velten left in 1980, Chappell served as interim intramural coordinator for the 1980-81 school year. She went back to her assistant position this past year when Larry Coffin was hired to head the department.

Realistically, Chappell was qualified to handle the top position in UMSL's intramural department. But she was expecting her first child when UMSL went searching for the new coordinator and knew she would miss a few months at the school. She gave birth to a girl, Michelle, last fall.

Still, Chappell's experience and expertise in UMSL intramurals benefitted many this past year, especially Coffin.

"Mary had a good understanding of what was going on at UMSL," Coffin said. "Without her, I would have been in trouble. I don't think I could have handled the job by myself."

Chappell lamented the lack of financial support given to UMSL's intramural program, but was impressed with those who participated.

"They are the ones you would like to find in every program," Chappell said. "The atmosphere was much more fun at UMSL than it was at K-State, where everything was blood and guts.

"But UMSL's program needs more money," she added. "Sometimes we were stiffled as far as being able to grow."

Chappell doesn't have to worry about UMSL's problems any more. She now is in an entirely different situation.

"Kansas has a building twice the size of the Mark Twain Building that is just for recreation," she boasted. "There is so much more you can do on a residential campus like KU that has so many students.

"But my job at UMSL was a good stepping stone. I've learned a lot."

Now, it's time to go home.

### **Hudson adds five kickers**

"Debbie is really quick," Hudson said, "and she knows how to finish well.'

Leslie Mirth, a tall defender from Hazelwood East High School, is the new addition to the defense. According to Hudson, Mirth "has a lot of size and distributes the ball well.'

Hudson found two outstanding goalkeepers, Ruth Harker and Susan Snyder, who should challenge returning goalie Cindy Hickle for the starting nod.

Harker, who plays for the Trammell Crow Blazers amateur team, is regarded as one of the best goalkeepers in the Midwest, while Snyder, a transfer from Florida, also is recognized

as a top-flight keeper.

Hudson also added a fifth player whose last name should be familiar to UMSL soccer fans. She is Barb Murphy, a midfielder from DuBourg High School who is the younger sister of Jim and Tim Murphy, who played for UMSL last year. Tim Murphy will be an assistant to Hudson on this year's women's team.

"It was a slim year for recruits in the St. Louis area," Hudson said, "but I think we got the best."

The Riverwomen will meet their stiffest competition in tournament play. Sept. 24 through 26, UMSL will host the St. Louis National Women's College Soccer Budweiser Tourney, featuring powers Indiana U., Wisconsin University and national finalist University of Central Florida.

UMSL will travel to Central Florida in October to participate in the UCF Invitational.

## Stickrod caps UMSL's bumper recruiting crop

Junior-college basketball standout Candace Stickrod has signed a letter of intent to play basketball at UMSL this season.

Stickrod, a 5-foot-11 for-ward from Muscatine Community College in Iowa, is the fifth women's recruit to sign with UMSL this year. She also is the third junior-college signee, joining Deb Skerik and Georgia Hinson.

'Kandy's decision to come to UMSL has capped off a very successful recruiting year," said UMSL head coach Mike Larson. "She is not only a very talented athlete, but team play is important to her, and that's why I feel she will fit in well with our program.'

Stickrod set several school records in her two years at Muscatine, including 31 points in one game and a 21.0 season scoring average. She averaged 17 points per game this past season, which was fifth in the National Junior College Athletic Association Region XI. In addition, Stickrod averaged eight rebounds and three steals per game, and showed 50 percent from the field and 68 percent from the free throw line.

Stickrod received All-Conference and All-Region recognition two years in a row and was named her team's Most Valuable Player this past season.

## **Anxious Dallas awaits decision on transfers**

For the next couple of days, Rivermen soccer coach Don Dallas will pace nervously outside the Office of Admissions and Information like a father-to-be outside the delivery room.

Dallas anxiously awaits the transfer of six of his top junior-college recruits. The admissions office is engulfed in red tape concerning the transfer of junior-college players. A junior-college transfer must have a minimum of 50 credit-hours to be accepted at UMSL.

"It's really tough on juniorcollege players because not all their classes transfer, and they don't know if they're going to make it until a month or so before the season starts," explained Dallas.

Waiting anxiously with Dallas on the decision of the office are Florissant Valley standouts John O'Mara, Kevin Fryer and John Pallet. Dallas' improvement efforts also extend over to Illinois, where he is awaiting the transaction of three Lewis and Clark products: Greg Speece, Dennis Beckman and Scott Graham.

And if the delay of his

junior-college transfers wasn't enough to turn a head coach's hair a shade grayer, the untimely bad news of his top high-school recruit was. Mike Pieri, a first-team All-State player, will have to wait another year to bring his talents to the UMSL soccer field.

The day after Pieri signed with the Rivermen, the former CBC High School star was diagnosed as having a brain tumor and cannot return to soccer for five months.

"That really hurts. It's not often we get a first-team All-State player," Dallas said.

However, one CBC standout that will make the transaction to college soccer at UMSL this year is striker Mike McAlone. Mc-Alone was an honorable-mention All-State player last year for the Cadets.

Yet another ring of uncertainty surrounds the UMSL kickers. Bill Rosner, another Rivermen hopeful, has his leg in a cast. Rosner sat out last year because of grades, and was expected to help the Rivermen in their quest to repeat a Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship.

However, even after facing a

year's worth of adversity before the season starts, Dallas is very optimistic. He returns All-MIAA players Ed Weiss, Tony Pusateri and Scott Chase. Bret Gove, the second leading scorer on last year's roster, also returns in an UMSL uniform.

As has always happened in the past, Dallas feels there will be players, overshadowed from the year before, who will take a step forward and lead the team. "Last year it was Mike Bess. He really came into his own and scored some goals for us," Dallas said.
